<b>2017</b>	The Metropolitan Washington Airports Authority- over the past five years, the Metropolitan Washington Airports Authority has established a strong record of achievement that is reflected in well-executed operational, financial and capital management that has greatly improved the passenger experience for the traveling public.
<b>2016</b>	T. Allan McArtor, Chairman and CEO, Airbus Group, Inc. as his career has been defined by the ideal of service and the belief that aviation has the power to transform lives. Through many roles – combat aviator, FedEx executive, FAA Administrator, airline founder, leader at Airbus – his dedication to his industry and the people it serves has never wavered.
<b>2015</b>	Leo J. Schefer, Past President Washington Airports Task Force for his eminently successful leadership of the Washington Airports Task Force and his local efforts to promote and improve the National Capital region’s air service, and for his support nationally for United States aviation policies that are of fundamental importance to the economic growth of the nation.
<b>2014</b>	John S. Pistole, Transportation Security Administration (TSA) longest serving Administrator has been the champion for transforming TSA into a risk-based, intelligence-driven agency that has moved away from a “one-size-fits-all” approach to security, and has implemented a strategy grounded in identifying low-risk populations and expediting their screening at many U.S. airports.

Altman, CAAFI Executive Director and the Commercial Aviation Alternative Fuels Initiative team (CAAFI) for their successful coordination of worldwide efforts to develop, produce on an industrial scale, certify and introduce into daily airline service, biojet fuels with a dramatically reduced carbon footprint.

Kelly, Captain Jeff Martin, and The Southwest Team were awarded the William’s Trophy for their decisive leadership in creating a system-wide reduction in Greenhouse Gases, initially of 6%, and in so doing, demonstrating that Greenhouse Gas reduction can go hand-in-hand with reduced operating costs and stockholder gains.

2003	General John R. "Jack" Dailey, USMC (ret.) For his accomplishments in the field of aviation and space exploration that have led the way to significant benefits for America and its military services.
2002	James A. Wilding for his long-term leadership and influence on airport policies worldwide, and for his leadership in moving the airports serving the Nation's Capital from being among the worst to being among the best in the nation.
2001	Frederick W. Smith and his team for his air cargo innovation and for leadership of a dedicated global employee family that made guaranteed overnight delivery a reality and changed the way the world does business.
2000	Lt. General Thomas H. Miller, USMC, ret. - Throughout his distinguished military career, General Miller's dedication, vision and leadership has resulted in significant benefit for people all over the world, and in particular to residents of the National Capital Region and visitors to Washington arriving by air. For the last 50 years, Miller has played a leading and often decisive role in the evolution of vertical flight and its application to the benefit of literally millions of civilian and military personnel.

1997	The Honorable John Glenn - As a Marine Corps pilot, Mercury astronaut and U.S. Senator, John Glenn has fought, tested, explored, researched, engineered, and led aviation and space exploration, not just to accomplish, but also to attain the knowledge to improved the health and enhance the lives of people on earth.
1996	Honorable Carrington Williams - The trophy is named in his honor as the founding chairman of the Washington Airports Task Force from 1982 to 1996.
